The department of Animal Husbandry has just added to its herd three pure brea Shorthorns, purchased at the B.O. Cowan sale in Kansas City, and one Herford cow, a winner in the recent American Royal Cattle Show. The department is buildin up an unusually good herd of pure ored animals of the beet breeds.

These are to be used for illustrative purposes in the students' judging pavillon.

Any surplus of animals bred on the University Farm finds a ready market at good prices. One individual of the Herford breed was soid a few days ago for \$350.

Are not the stockmen of Nebraska sufficiently interested to send their sons to the only school in the state where animal husbandry is taught thoroughly? The School opened on Nevember 11th, and students are still being received.

CHLOROFORMING INCURABLES.

"The civilization of today has not been ground to that razor-edged keenness when the painless putting to their final sleep of incurables would be justified," said a well-known Washington alienist. The power of the state to legislate for the protection of the majority against the acts of the minorlty is undisputed, and is exemplified in many ways, notably in arresting lawbreakers and confining them in prisons, the control and restraint of lunatics, and the seizing and isolation of smallpox patients. In the advanced civilization of fature centuries this power will have been greatly extended, and will, no doubt, place na fron-bound restriction upon the marciage of persons in undesirable mental and physical condition, with the oblect of the benefit of man-kind in general."-Washington Star.
