Morehead were not elected, it not only would be a repudiation of Morehead, but a slap at President Wilson and his policies.

Mr. Locke said in part: "The Democratic candidate for railway commissioner was recently dragged out of a room, taken to the police station and fined under an assumed name for gambling. Do we have to vote for him in order to support President Wilson?"

"The Initiative and Referendum is the acid test of whether a man is Democratic or not. Morehead while in the senate voted to hamstring the bill for direct legislation.

"Mr. Howell is a large strong figure, a heaven-sent gift to Democracy and good government in Nebraska. Mr. Howell is instinctively straight. He is by nature honest. He is a man of wonderful efficiency. His leadership will be intellectual."

After Mr. Locke finished the students discussed the question. Apparently all except one were for Howell.
