**ART EXHIBIT OPENED BY BIG RECEPTION**

Opening Reception Held Last Night—Fifty Paintings Now on Exhibition in Art Hall.

The opening reception to the stockholders of the Art Association and to all students holding tickets was held in the Art Gallery last night. A fair-sized crowd was present. The reception opened the annual Mid-Winter Art Exhibit.

Fifty paintings, all but six of which are from the Carnegie collection, are on the wall, and together these represent one of the most costly collections that was ever in the middle west. The six paintings of Dr. Lawton Parker of Chicago are of the same high class as the others, and attract fully as much attention as the work of the other artists.

Dr. Lowry of Lincoln, in calling attention to one of the features of the exhibit, stated that ten nationalities were represented by the exhibit, both by the home of the painter and by the theme of the picture.

The University of Nebraska is the first to exhibit the collection in the west, and from here the pictures will be sent to the east for three more exhibits before they are returned to the Carnegie collection. Therefore considerable distinction attaches to the University by reason of its securing the exhibit, and no little credit is due those who have had the matter in charge.

The paintings will be in Lincoln in the Art Gallery for three weeks, and during that time any of the number may be bought. It has been the custom of the University to purchase several from such collections that have been in Lincoln in the past few years, and it is expected that some will be bought this year. The paintings range in price from \$400 to \$10,000, and the value of the whole collection makes an interesting subject for wild imaginations.

During the exhibit lectures are given which are open to all holding tickets, one of which secures admission for the holder to see the collection at any time.

**GIRLS BASKET BALL STARTED YESTERDAY**

The Juniors' winners for the last two years are practicing hard to meet the strong competition offered; while the Seniors are depending upon Marie Clark to uphold their standard. All signs point toward much interest, and Miss Beghtol, coach of girls basket ball, predicts a very successful season.
