Fraternity Trouble at Syracuse Considerable trouble has been perienced at Syracuse University re cently in regard to initiation without he proper pre-requisite scholarship The following rules have been inaus urated by a facuity committee

1. No student shall be initiated until he has been in residence one full semeste
2. No student shall be initiated who has failed in more than $2 \theta$ per cent of the work required of a regular student in the college in which he is regis
tered (to illustrate: 15 hours are re quired in liberal arts)
3. A student failing to pass the re quired number of houre at the regular semester examinations shall not be initiated until he has completed a fuil 80 per cent of the work required of regular student in the college in which he is registered.
4. Entrance deficiencies shall be counted in determining a candidate's eligibility.
5. The Registrar shall certify the eligibility in the Daily Orange.
