All the games scheduled for tonight will be fast contests. Shelton will be remembered as the team which put South Omaha out of the running a year ago. Elmwood, the little school which created a sensation in the 1912 tournament, is said to have a very strong quintet and is doped to do things in Class B. Friend, Wahoo, Falls City, and Pawnee City are all preceded by fast reputations.

A feature for tonight's opening will be the presence of Stanley L. Simonsen of New York City, better known as Sam Stretch, who will give exhibitions of his peculiar power between contests. Simonsen is a "stretcher" as his cognomen implies. Some of his stunts are: Stretching in height from normal, six and one-half inches; stretching his neck from normal, four and one-half inches; stretching his leg from normal, fourteen inches; stretching either arm from normal, nine inches; stretching both arms from normal, seven inches; shortening his leg from normal, four inches; shortening either arm from normal, four and one-half inches; shortening neck from normal, two and one-half inches. Expansion of leg four inches over normal size, chest (muscular, without intake of breath) nine inches. Simonsen is on his way to the exposition at San Francisco, and is giving exhibitions enroute. He has created considerable interest among medical men, who, it is claimed, are baffled by his phenomenal contortions.
