The bride was attended by Miss Florinda Young and Miss Esther Thomas, sister of the groom, Before the ceremony, Harry M. Cooper sang "Because."


The bride formerly lived in Iowa City. Since her mother has resided in Lincoln she has spent part of the time here the past two years.
