ACCUSE BOARD OF BRIBE

Saratoga Pool Hall Would Lose Its Patronage if Field is Flooded for Skating

At last the cat is out of the bag—the failure of the Athletic Department to flood Nebraska Field is explained. The reason given was that the water seeped into the ground as fast as it was turned on, but the real reason, so it is rumored, is that the Athletic Department has been bribed. Business interests in Lincoln, by means of a sum of money said to be a thousand dollars, has prevailed upon the Athletic Department to refrain from flooding the field.

It has long been the custom of the students of the Law College and a few scattered students of the other colleges to spend their spare moments between classes at the Saratoga, learning some of the more complicated shots of the game of pool. Now there is a light charge made by the owners of this establishment for the use of the tables and cues, and the announcement of the fact that the Athletic Department expected flood the Athletic Field made them fear that their profits would be impaired because the students would spend their spare moments on the smooth surface of the Field instead of in the palace of cushions and cues.
