The above estimates are based on a campus attendance of 2,500 , or a total of $\$ 15,000$.

Who will pay?: All students registering for twelve or more hours will be forced to pay this tax, uniess excused as hereinafter provided. All those taking less than twelve hours will have their choice of paying the rax and receiving the priviegas, or not $w$ ying the Tax and not receiving the privileges.
Collection: The Tax will be collected by the University Treasurer as the ordinary fees of registration are now collected.
Excuses: Upon proof that the student is not financially able to pay this Tax, and will receive no benefit from its objects, he may be excused therefrom. The sole judges of his reasons shall be such persons as the board of regents shall appoint.
Athletics: The above named sum will be apportioned to both the men's and the women's athletics. Any stadent who is duly registered and has paid the Single Tax will athletic exhibitions free.
Daily Nebraskan: This money will be distributed by the publication board, or someone selected by the regents. It will be used in making a better and more representative paper. Each student will be entitled to a copy of each issue of The Daily Nebraskan.

Debate: This sum will be in the hands of the debating board, or anyne whom the regents may select, All students will be admitted to the ebates free.
University Night: This amount will ssure two performances of the program, thus permitting all students to have a seat free of charge, and without waiting for hours in the line in he Temple.
Dramatics: This sum will be turned over to the School of Drama, not the Dramatic club. It will assure to each student a free performance of each and every play that the School Drama presents publicly.
Mixers: The Single Tax will permit a proper number of mixers during the year, given to the students ree of charge.
Ivy Day: The sum appropriated to this occasion will mean a successful all-university celebration free of charge.
Incidental: This sum is set aside for rallies and emergencies that may rise from time to time.
Alteration of these rules: These ules may be altered from time to time by the regents or anyone to whom they may delegate the power. it is understood that such alteration will not fundamentally change the plan above outlined.
