## complete discussion of the sub

 ject, "Technical Education in Europe, is not possible in a short article; an as the writer from personal observa tion only knows the technical colleges of Germany and the Scandinavian countries, a more detailed description will be given of these institutions than of those of other European countries.It might be of interest first to give n outline of the early history of some of the European technical colleges. The majority of these institutions uilding schools, nearly all of the pres ont German colleges started as such about one hundred years ago. The oldest real technical college conducted upon the modern plan (nct merely trade school) is the Ecole Poiytech in 1794. The next was a similar in stitute at Prague, Bohemia, which stitute at Prague, Bohemia, whic
adopted the system of the Paris inst tute in 1806; then came the institut Vienna, which came the institut change in 1815.
The technical colleges in Germany and other European countries were all founded during the nineteenth century.
A German technical college is, con trary to what is the case in this coun try, always separated from other co taught; such a college of the highest taught; such a college of the highest
type is called Technische Hochschule, literally translated into English, Teehnical High School; it might also rightly be translated with the Englisi word "University," as a similiar insti tution in this country would be called a university, although the German word Universitat only applies to an institution where ocher scle
