1. Any university or college teacher of recognized scholarship or scientific productivity who holds, and for ten years has held, a position of teaching or research in an American university or college, or in a professional school of similar grade, may be nominated for membership in the association.

2. No person whose principal occupation is not that of education or research and no administrative officer who does not give a substantial amount of instruction shall be eligible for membership.
