## PAGEANT WILL BE PRESENTED TONIGHT

THE GATE CITY FEATURED THIS YEAR

Professor Scott is the Director-University Students in Leading Roles

The second annual pageant of Lincoln is presented tonight and tomorrow, on the university athletic field. Dr. Alexander has again written the book for the pageant and has, this year, also had charge of the costuming. The music by Dr. Eames, promises to be a feature of the play. Professor Scott has been training the cast for several weeks and the whole performance will be an artistic triumph.

The subject of this year's pageant is "The Gate City," and the play is a masque of Omaha. The performance is in two parts, the sacred tree of the Omaha tribe, and Coronado's vision. In the first, the dances of the animal spirits and the war dances of the Indians are featured. The second pictures the Spanish discoverer, who is supposed to have reached Nebraska's boundaries and shows the vision which for the pageants and his work in literhe sees of the coming city of Omaha.

The pageant is presented under the auspices of the Lincoln Commercial club, which has decided to make this an annual event. Last year's pageant presenting the founding of Lincoln, was the first of the series and its splendid success insured the continuance of this as one of the most beautiful traditions of Lincoln and of the university.

## SIXTH SCHOOL OF SUPERINTENDENCE OPENS

PROMINENT EDUCATORS ARE SE-CURED AS LEADERS

Nebraska School Leaders Meet to Consider Various Educational Problems

The sixth annual school of superintendence begins at 10 o'clock today. Prominent Nebraska school men from all over the stae are here for the week to attend its sessions. Superintendents Hunter of Lincoln, Everhart of Hastings, Bodwell of Tecumseh, Graff of Omaha, Stoner of York, Barr of Grand Island, and Waterhouse of Fremont, preside at the various ses-

As leaders, three educators of national note have been secured. Dr. Walter S. Monroe of Kansas, Prof. John L. Riley of Massachusetts, and Dr. A. E. Winship of Massachusetts, will lecture on modern educational problems and preside at round tables on questions of school management. Dr. Monroe has received his academic degrees from the Universities of Missouri and Chicago, and is, at present, director of the Bureau of Educational Measurements for the state of Kansas. He is chairman of the National Association of Directors of Educational Research. Professor Riley received his degrees for Columbia university and is, at present, principal of schools at Springfield, Mass. He is noted for the development of the sixty-three-three plan in the Springfield school system. Dr. Winship is well known as the eidtor of the Journal of Education and as a national leader in educational circles:
