His service on the Nebraska faculty dates from 1907, when he was made inspector of accredited schools and assistant professor of Secondary Education. In 1908, this department was fully organized as a part of the Teachers' college.

The Bureau on Recommendation of Teachers, of which Professor Reed has charge, was organized early in the history of the university, under Chancellor McLean. Professor Reed took charge of it in 1909.

Professor Reed has had charge of the Extension department since 1911. He has also had general supervision of the summer session since 1909. His

efficient work along all of these lines serves to make the university of vital use to thousands of Nebraskans.

The Daily Cardinal, student newspaper at the University of Wisconsin, will publish during summer session this year for the first time. It will appear twice a week and will be edited by three students on the regular staff.
