LUCKEY SPEAKS ON TEACHER TRAINING

Dean Luckey spoke at Monday's convocation on "The Value of Research as a Means of Teacher Training." The modern conception of education, it was pointed out, namely, that it is the development of man from within rather than his modification from without demands that the true teacher must be a scientist who studies the nature of his pupils in order to rightly direct this development. For such teaching the training afforded by original research is vital, as a means of preparation. Dean Luckey paid tribute to some of the Nebraska men who had won renown for their research in their particular lines, mentioning especially Dr. Howard of Sociology and Dr. Wolfe of Psychology.

DEAF EDUCATOR ADDRESSES CHILD STUDY CLASS

Prof. James W. Sowell of the Deaf School of Omaha, addressed the Child Study class yesterday morning, his topic being the different methods used in education of deaf, and what is claimed by advocates of the different methods. Mr. Sowell received his master's degree from Johns Hopkins about five years ago, and is now working towards his doctor's degree in English and Education. Professor Sowell has been deaf since he was seven years of age. He will address the Adolescence class at 11 o'clock today, on the same subject.
