The state treasurer's report at the Capitol show that before Mr. Hall's administration, these amounts were paid out of the University fund for interest: In 1903-1904, \$84.46; 1907-1908, \$2,897.50; 1908-1910, \$11,047.36; 1911-1912, \$13,511.93; 1913-1914, \$10,523.96; December 1, 1914 to March 31, 1915, \$2,254.39.
