

Not mere opinion or belief, but concrete action, is the test of spirit, in the opinion of Miss Adelia Dodge, field secretary of the north-central district of the Y. W. C. A., who spoke on "Dramatized Religion" at Vespers yesterday afternoon,

"We like to see things in action. We give pageants to illustrate passive facts; we enjoy moving pictures because they give us life-size pictures of action. In just such a way should we show our interest in our religion -by doing things."

This activity, which is the concrete expression of spirit, should not be resultless; it should accomplish something; more than the obvious, the routine, should be done.
