WANTS 14 Y. W. C. A. GENEVA DELEGATES
UNIVERSITY ASSOCIATION ANNOUNCES PLANS OF ANNUAL STUDENT CONFERENCE

The University of Nebraska Y. W. C. A. hopes to have at least fourteen delegates attend the annual central student conference which will be held at Lake Geneva, Wis., June 19 to 29. Any University woman who can attend the conference is asked to notify either Miss Fannie Drake, Y. W. C. A. secretary, or Mary Hedrick, '18, chairman of the conference committee. The girls who will represent the association will be announced next week.

The forenoons of the conference days will be devoted to study. Besides the regular bible work classes on modern problems will be held. The progress and effect of Christianity in South America, Turkey, and India, will be especially emphasized. Country life and woman's community responsibilities will also be studied. The last period of the morning is to be given over to the consideration of the technical association problems in various councils, including sessions for presidents, cabinet members and general secretaries.

The afternoons are left entirely free for rest and recreation. The plans for this part of the day are in the hands of girls who are athletic leaders in their own colleges. All kinds of intercollegiate tournaments have been arranged, tennis, basketball, baseball, hiking and water sports. There will be a boat ride around the lake, excursions to the famous Yerkes observatory and a number of informal picnics.

The cost of the trip has been estimated at about \$45.
