tic labor leaders have more or less openly advocated decreased human efficiency, decreased output, the wrecking of machinery, strikes and dynamite, with the sole view of ultimately making the products of labor artificially dear and the awards of labor artificially great in proportion to the value of the service rendered. In the face of constantly rising prices, we have heard even an advocacy of decreasing agricultural production in order to starve a part of the people into paying ruinous prices for the products of the land. Fortunately among the sensible, patriotic farmers of Nebraska, this talk has received no response. In the midst of all these selfish words and acts, in the midst of those whose greed in war times would imperil even the existence of this nation, this state hospital dedicated to the curing of diseases and the prevention of human waste, represents an altruistic movement, wholly devoid of class selfishness and absolutely in harmony with the thought of the greatest leader of mankind when He said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

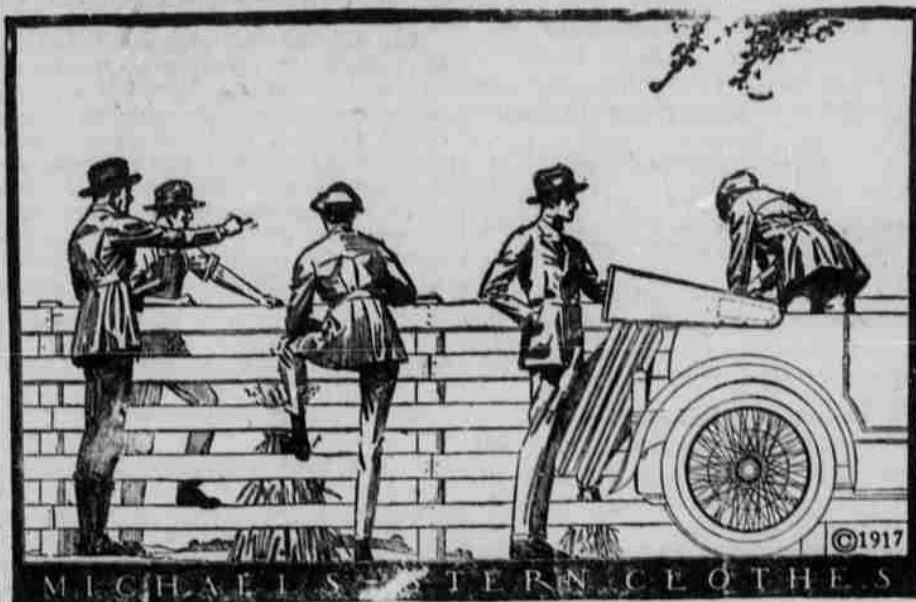
### Agricultural Club to Have Party Saturday Night
