Lantern is about three times as large as that of The Daily Nebraskan. Nine editors, five department heads and sixteen reporters got out the editions of the Columbus Citizen.

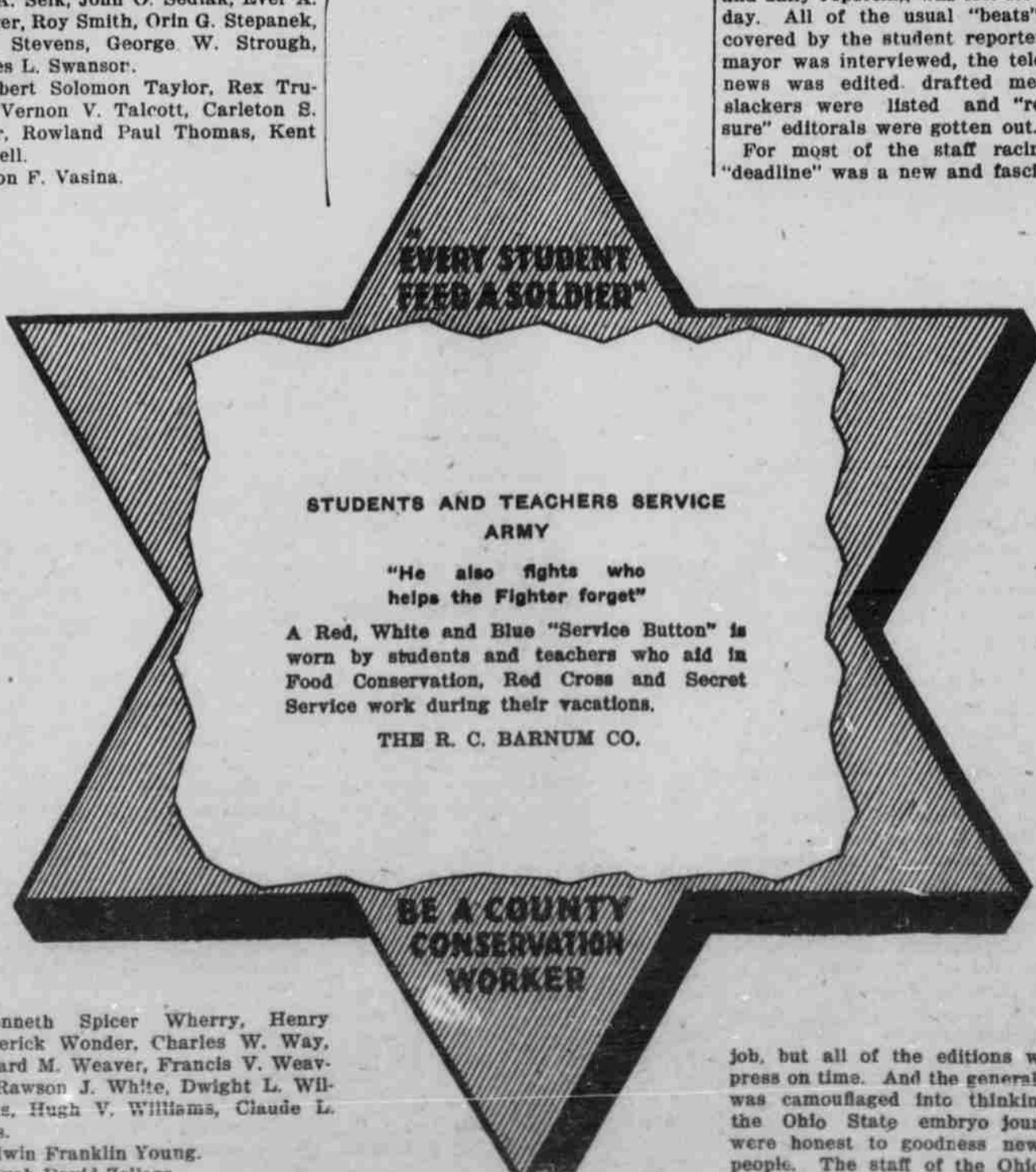
ALUMNAE MAKE OFFER OF NEW SCHOLARSHIP

\$100 Will Be Awarded Annually to One Co-Ed Under Classman

At its last meeting the Nebraska branch of the association of collegiate alumnae decided to offer a scholarship of \$100 to a woman who is attending the University of Nebraska for the 1918-19. The following are the rules required of the applicant:

1. An applicant must be in either her freshman or sophomore year at the date of application. When she holds the scholarship she must be either a sophomore or a junior.
 2. An applicant must have been and be wholly or in part self-supporting.
 3. An applicant must be a regularly enrolled student in the University of Nebraska. She must have a good standing at the date of application.
 4. An applicant must have some interests in the general school activities and a high scholarship average.
 5. Every applicant must fill out a regular application blank, which may be obtained from Miss Amanda Heppner, dean of women; Miss Fannie Drake, secretary of University Y. W. C. A., or Miss Sarah Muir, chairman of the scholarship committee.
 6. Every applicant must give five references. Three of these should be from persons on the campus and the other two from persons not connected with the University.
 7. The scholarship of \$100 will be paid in two parts of \$50 each semester.
 8. The same person may not hold the scholarship for more than one year.
 9. All applications for the year of 1918-19 must be sent eventually to Miss Sarah L. Muir, 1801 South Seventeenth street, Lincoln, by May 15.
- The award will be announced as soon as the second semester records are available at the registrar's office.
