OFFICIAL ORDERS

A rumor is being circulated among the students of the University that those who enter the S. A. T. C. will be provided by the government with the necessary equipment but will be on a furlough status, and to receive no pay during the school year, and that they will have a six weeks' camp in summer when all expenses will be paid, and they will receive the pay of a private.

There is absolutely no foundation to this rumor except that an old circular has been dug up by somebody and has been passed around.

The true status of the S. A. T. C. student is just as has been explained in recent publications in the newspapers, and no credence should be given to any more rumors circulated.

All S. A. T. C. students will be members of the United States army and will be quartered and subsisted at the expense of the army, and will be equipped and paid the pay of a private by the army.

Any material change in the status of S. A. T. C. students would be given wide publicity in the newspapers and could be ascertained readily at the S. A. T. C. headquarters.

They will receive pay at \$30 per month and their expenses will be paid to include barracks subsistence, tuition and other university expenses. I would advise you not to worry over rumors. All changes will be officially announced through the Nebraskan.
