Professor Bengston at Washington—Professor N. A. Bengston of the department of geography is at Washington this year serving in the technical branch of war orders board. He has charge of the wheat industry. Professor Bengston writes the University that he misses the association on the campus at Nebraska and greatly regrets his inability to be with students and faculty.

Military Geography Course—A course in military geography is to consider chiefly the geography in Europe with special reference to the war fronts and the economic materials of the war. Several professors and instructors are to assist in giving the course. Many lantern slides, maps and a number of motion pictures will be used. The course will have practical value to military students and to others who are trying to keep up with the times. Professors Condra, La Rossignol, Lees, Fossler, Conklin,

Grumann and Jones will give the course.

Course in Military Mapping—Mr. J. G. MacIntosh, who has had extensive work on the Canada topographic survey, will be at the University in a few days to assist in giving a course on military mapping in the department of geography. The students in this course are to be grouped according to their experience and needs.

DR. LELAND DESIGNATED AS S. A. T. C. CHAPLAIN

Has Spent Three Months As Camp Pastor With Tank Corps at Gettysburg

Dr. Dean R. Leland has been designated by Captain MacIvor as the volunteer chaplain of the University of Nebraska S. A. T. C., including the military detachment stationed here.

The government has been unable to

assign commissioned chaplains to the smaller military detachments at universities and to the S. A. T. C. These commissioned chaplains are used with the forces in Europe and the large cantonments here. However, the government has provided that volunteer chaplains may be designated by the commanding officers of S. A. T. C. camps.

Dr. Leland will perform the duties of chaplain so far as it may concern the 2500 men located at Nebraska. He spent five months, from April to September, at Camp Colt, Gettysburg, Pa., among 9000 men of the tank corps, as camp pastor. In addition, he has been a university pastor here for the past nine years, so is familiar with this university, the city, army camp life and the needs and interests of men of university age.
