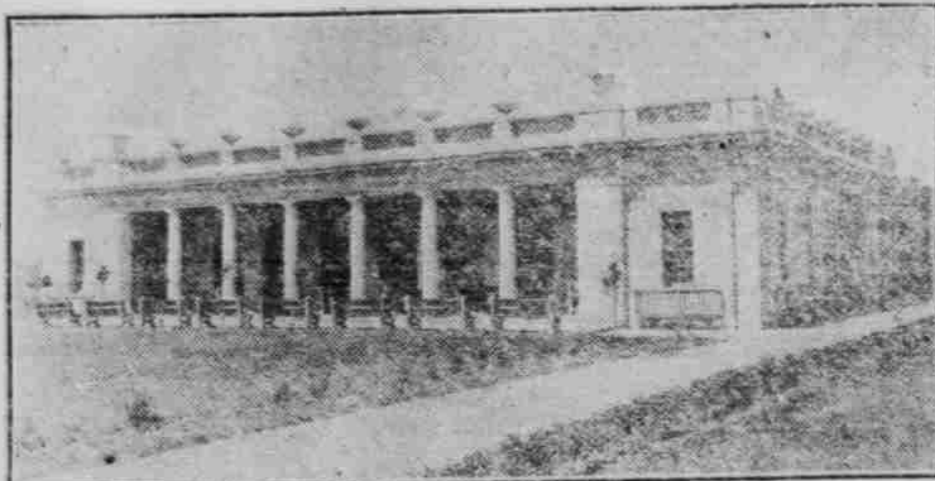
Announcement

ALL REQUESTS TO GO THROUGH CHANCELLOR
