S. commenced to come back. They were given every opportunity possible by university authorities to make up the school work they had missed and thus keep up with their classes.

Soon, other officers and men who had been stationed in camps on this side were on the campus again. For

many of them it was the first sight of school in nearly two years. Before long, all of them will be back; all except those honored few who were permitted to give their lives in the service of their country and the greatest cause that humanity has ever known. It is a wonderful thing for these boys to be able to come back and see everything as it was before they left. Many of them gained a new vision of the great value of the university life and all its activities. The result will probably be a better university from every point of view.
