NEBRASKA HALL BEING REDECORATED INSIDE

Although the exterior transformation of Nebraska Hall will not take place until the summer months, the work of refinishing and rearranging the interior is well under way.

The library is almost fully equipped now, and the new laboratory rooms are being rapidly put into condition. The plan of lighting in several of the lecture rooms has been greatly improved by the rearrangement of seats and the retinting of walls. The new display room will soon contain specimens of the department's work and the glass cases are already in evidence for this purpose.

In the main hall on the first floor hangs an enormous map, depicting the physical features of Nebraska—drainage, topography, and soil regions. This map was made by Professor Condra of the department of geography and conservation. Other hand-colored pictures of typical Nebraska scenes will adorn the walls of this hall.

The work in the studio on the second floor has been held up of late on account of the fact that certain necessary lighting fixtures could not be obtained. When this studio is completed it will be an ideal place for the photographing of prominent men and women of the university in natural poses with motion pictures—and this is its prime object.

Another feature of the building when remodeled will be the convention hall on the second floor. This hall will be situated where the old museum was once located, and the whole end of the building will be torn out to make the required changes for this assembly room. It will seat approximately six hundred people and special invitations will be extended to the farmers of Nebraska to visit this room when in Lincoln. On this same floor, motion-picture hall, where motion picture lectures and programs will be given will seat nearly one hundred persons.

Lieut. Elmer Campbell of Omaha, a former student at the University of Nebraska, was chosen for the honor of taking the only official army photograph from the air of President Wilson's visit to Paris for permanent war records of the United States.

Lieutenant Campbell received his commission at the first officers' training school at Fort Snelling, and was chosen for an aviation school. He was sent to France almost as soon as he graduated and was immediately made a chasse pilot. Several months later he was placed in charge of all the bombing planes at one of the largest air camps in France.
