Miss Burner Continues Discussion on Campus Problems Before University Women.

"Fundamentally democracy is the attitude of the mind of the individual," Miss Oolooah Burner said at the mass meeting held Thursday evening at the Woman's Hall. "If we are not careful we do only the easier things of the moment. Some people go only as far as the surface of the subject, but to solve things we must get down to the principal of it. There is no simpler way of acquiring the spirit of it than to study the great leader of democracy, Jesus Christ, and his works.

When a person begins to specialize in a subject, she first studies it then practices it, and works out in the laboratory of experience what has been found. Then she takes up the works of the leader in the subject and studies his works thoroughly. She must get her mind in accordance with his mind to obtain those results fulfilling conditions.

The people one associates with most are the people one is most like. One acquires the other's ways, methods and ideas for such is the law of interaction between personalities. It makes him better able to place himself in a position in which democracy will become easier. Democracy is the recognition of folks as folks. By the simple laws of psychology the individual will begin to be democratic.

A very large crowd attended the mass meeting and Alice Allen presided. Florine Reed gave a whistling solo. There will be a supper for all university girls Friday evening at the Woman's Hall at which Miss Burner will speak again. The invitation is extended not only to every university girl but to all the faculty.
