Four members of the library staff
attended the state library association
in Omaha yesterday. Miss Nellie
Compton read a paper on "Letters
of Susan Hale," Miss Josephine Lam-
mers on "Research on Marines in the
United States History," and Profes-
sor Malcolm Wyer on "Library War
Service."

A water color exhibition is now be-

the Library building. It is the work
of Elizabeth Spalding and has un-
usual merit. Miss Spalding has done
most of her painting in Colorado. Ex-
hibitions are open mornings, Satur-
days, and Sunday afternoons from

A NEW O. HENRY BOOK
A new O. Henry book, "Waifs and
Strays," was brought out October 11th
by Doubleday, Page & Company. A
dozen short stories never before pub-
lished in a popular edition are here
assembled. Together with them ap-
pears a wealth of anecdote, reminisc-
ence, and appreciation of the man
who invested with new wonder the
City of Too Many Caliphs. Among
the stories is included "The Snow
Man," the last tale O. Henry ever
worked on. Death, it will be remem-
bered, struck him down before the
end was reached and Harris Merton
Lyon—who now also is dead—finished
the story in accordance with an out-
line O. Henry had sketched to him.
The Lyon ending is given in the forth-
coming book.

The personal reminiscences are con-
tributed by Arthur W. Page, who
quotes vividly from O. Henry's cor-
respondence, George Jean Nathan,
Arthur Bartlett Maurice and others.
F. P. A., of the New York Tribune,
tells of his collaboration with O.
Henry on the one occasion when the
latter attempted to write for the stage.
Christopher Morley, whose new novel,
"The Haunted Bookshop," is creating
considerable furore on its own ac-
count just now, contributes an appre-
ciation in verse. So does Vachel Lin-
say. And there are critical estimates
by William Lyon Phelps, Stephen Lea-
cock, the Canadian humorist, and A.
St. John Adecock. Another feature of
considerable interest is a complete
index to all the O. Henry stories.
Taken altogether, the new book
promises a budget of material which
no lover of O. Henry can afford to
miss.
