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Whether of softly clinging Georgette weighted with much beading, or of bouffant taffeta with ruffled, draped and distended hip lines, the narrowness of the hem produces a slender effect that is distinctly youthful. The trend is toward much trimming, introducing braidings, embroideries, pleatings and combinations of materials.

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Jaunty top-coats show a marked preference for Polo Cloths, leather belts and English lines. Pockets in the majority of models are heavily stitched, and one notices that raglan sleeves and convertible collars are much in favor. Linings are chosen with as much care as the fabrics themselves, and show wonderful figured effects in pussy-willows and printed radiums.

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
