**MASS MEETING
TODAY AT 11**

Article II. The purpose of this organization shall be the relating of extra curricula activities to one another and to the University as a whole; the creation of such other expressions of student life as shall supplement those already established; the direction of such other matters of student interest as shall be initiated by or referred to the Student Council. The Council shall also act as a student court to investigate and make recommendations in such cases of minor discipline as shall be referred to it by the executive dean and the dean of women.

Article III. One member of the Council shall be selected to represent the Council on the Student Publication Board and also one to act on the Election Board and two on the University Week Committee.

Article IV. The Chairman of All-University Party Committee shall be a Student Council member. Four members of the Committee shall be named by the Council and four by the Dean of Women.

Article V. The Council shall be composed of the following representatives:

1. Twelve members apportioned as follows:
 - a. Seven junior men, one each from the College of Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Law, Pharmacy, Dentistry, and Business Administration.
 - b. Four junior women, one each from the College of Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Teachers and School of Fine Arts.
 - c. One man or woman from the Graduate College.

2. These twelve representatives shall be nominated from the floor at a mass meeting of their own college or school held at a time set by the Student Council, and shall be voted upon by the members of their own college or school at the regular Student Council election, the time of which shall be set by the Council.

3. Four seniors—two men and two women—nominated from the floor at a mass meeting of the junior class and elected by the student body at the regular Student Council election.

4. Four seniors—two men and two women—nominated and elected by the Student Council from the junior members of that body, to serve during the following year.

5. The sophomores who shall be non-voting members: The highest man and the highest woman officer of the freshmen class chosen at the second semester class election shall serve in this capacity.

Article VI. The regular Student Council election shall be held not earlier than April 1st, and not later than May 15th, of the year preceding that in which the members are to serve. Within these limits the date for election shall be set by the Student Council. Voting shall be by preferential ballot. Mass meetings for nominations shall be held at least one week before the election.

Article VII. Vacancies occurring in the Student Council shall be filled by the class or college in which the vacancy occurred not later than two weeks after notice of such vacancy has been given them by the Council. Chairman of the Student Council shall call mass meetings to fill such vacancies

and act as temporary chairman.

Article VIII. At the mass meetings for nominations there shall be at least two candidates nominated for each position to be filled. The names of suggested nominees shall be handed to the chairman in writing and a majority standing vote necessary to nominate each one. The temporary chairman of all such mass meetings shall be the Student Council representative from that college or class.

Article IX. Candidates to be eligible for election shall be members of the specific school or college and class as determined by the regular University

and shall have a scholastic average of at least 75 per cent for the preceding semester.

Article X. A meeting of the newly elected Student Council shall be called by the outgoing chairman within one week after the election day.

At this meeting the necessary officers shall be elected and the organization of the Council perfected. A chairman and a vice-chairman—one of whom shall be a man and the other a woman—shall be chosen in order to provide a chairman for separate men's and women's sessions at such times as they seem expedient.

Article XI. Mass meetings of students shall be called by the chairman of the Student Council at the direction of the Council, or upon the written request of fifty students of the University.

Students may present any proposal or grievance to the Council in writing or in person at any regular meeting.

Article XII. Amendments to this constitution or revisions of it may be presented to students in mass meetings assembled, and upon a majority vote of those present, shall be submitted for adoption to the student body at an election called for that purpose.

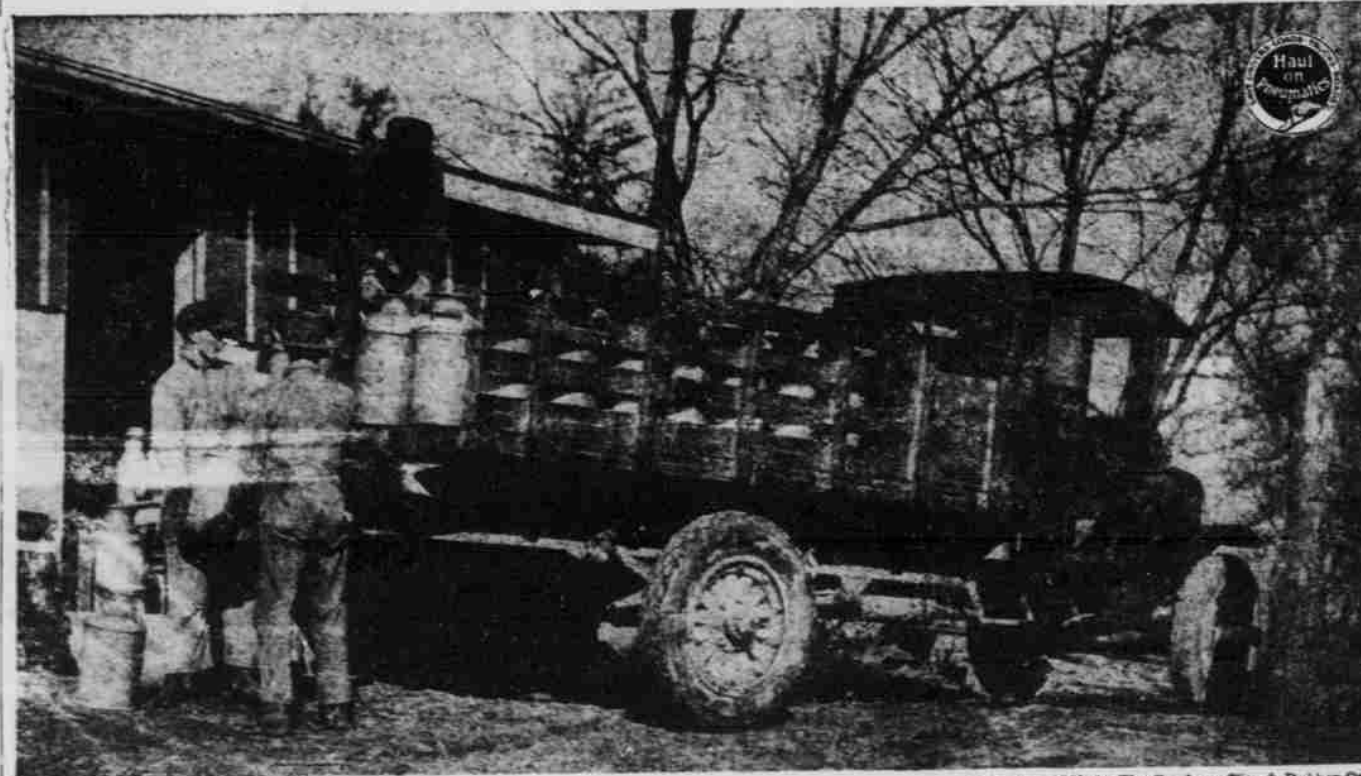
Frances Aldrich, ex-'22, of Nebraska City, is visiting friends in Lincoln this week.
