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COMPANY B WINS ANNUAL COMPET AT FARM CAMPUS

Captain Hauser Well Pleased
With Showing in Thursday's
Exhibition Drill.

The annual competitive drill of the Agricultural School cadets took place at the farm campus Thursday, April 15. Commandant John N. Hauser was well pleased with it.

In the company drill, Company B won the prize, a silver ring, which was placed on Cadet Color for that company. In the individual competitive drill Andrews won the first prize, a leather toilet case, given by Miller & Paine; Myers, the second prize, cloisonne enamel cuff links, given by the Armstrong Clothing Company; Gran, the third prize, a gold scarf pin, given by Tucker & Shean.

The companies ranked as follows: Company B was awarded 543 points; Company C, 530 points; Company A, 506 points; Company D, 493 points. Seniors stepped out and watched the farewell parade.

The compete was judged by C. J. Frankforter, Major U. S. C. R.; Jesse G. Fies, captain, F. A. U. S. R., and Brian O'Brien, ex-captain, F. A. The judging was done on a basis of ease and precision in execution of commands.

The bureau of professional service at the state university received 372 calls through March. Requests were made for 827 candidates; 126 persons were recommended. Besides Nebraska twenty states sent calls as Colorado, Utah, Arizona, Wisconsin, Montana, Iowa, Wyoming, South Dakota, Oregon, Oklahoma, Washington, Idaho, California, Kansas, Minnesota, Virginia, Michigan, Kentucky, New Mexico, Missouri. The calls were for grades, high schools and colleges.

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
