

**ENGINEERING STUDENTS  
WILL DEMONSTRATE WORK**

**Laboratories Open Tonight from  
7:30 to 10:00 for Benefit  
of the Curious.**

The College of Engineering will hold open house this evening from seven to ten o'clock, the laboratories in the three buildings on the campus devoted to engineering will be in operation for the benefit of the general public. Demonstrations of the work being done will be given by the students.

In the Mechanical Engineering Building the Freshmen in the wood-working laboratories on the second floor will be engaged in making patterns for the foundry, turned work, cabinets and other articles. Students in the foundry on the first floor will demonstrate the processes required for the production of iron castings. On the same floor Sophomores will do work on various shaped castings in the machine shops. Hydraulic machinery and all types of steam, gas and oil engines will be on display in the power laboratory.

Experiments in electricity will be conducted in the Electrical Engineering Building. A set of wireless telephone apparatus set up by two Junior students will be featured.

The Civil Engineers in the Mechanic Arts Hall will demonstrate the work of testing materials which is being done in the laboratories. Stunts in twisting steel rods and pulling solid steel bars apart will be part of the program. Maps and drawings made during the year will be displayed.

Engineers' Night is one of the features of Engineers' Week and has become to be one of the traditions of the campus. On this occasion the University at large and the public can gain some idea of the work being done by the Engineering students.
