PSYCHOLOGICAL TESTS.

In many of the eastern colleges, psychological tests are taking the place of the old terrors of entrance examinations. The new test is known as the Binet mental system, "the idea being to measure the student's intelligence rather than his knowledge."

The system was first established in France by Albert Binet for the discovery of the per cent of mentally retarded students in his country. High school and preparatory students can be coached to pass entrance examinations when their intelligence does not class them as material for further educational development.

The requirements of the Binet system for admission to colleges are included in the applicant's health record, his character, and promise of development and his school record. The radical departure from the old system is the doing away of the old style of entrance examinations to find the student's knowledge of the subjects required by the college. This departure is covered by the psychological tests which determine whether he is qualified to continue his schooling.

GET ACQUAINTED AT CHURCH.
