In discussing the matter of mission study before the members of the Committee of 200 Tuesday evening, Dr. Huntington announced that outside courses for the study of the home and foreign missionary fields will be offered at the beginning of the second semester. There will be classes for men and women on these subjects. Different days in the week and as many hours as possible will be open in order that anyone who wishes to register for this work may arrange his schedule to include one of the classes.

**Foreign Missionary Work.**

There are quite a number of University students who are at the present time planning to take up work in the foreign missionary fields, according to those in charge of this work. These students represent the medical, engineering, teaching and home economics professions. The fact that these students are actively interested in this work was shown not long ago when a representative of one of the denominations was in Lincoln. He held conferences with thirty students of his denominations who were interested in this work.

The Committee of 200 will undertake the Life Service Work this year in a different way than it has been carried on before. Last year the program was covered by the "After College What?" week. General convocations were held and meetings of the different colleges were held to discuss the work. Many of the colleges had attendances of over 100 at their meetings, and the total number of students at all the convocations was 2,270. It is expected that as much and more interest will be taken in the work this year than ever before.

The meeting will be held in Chicago from January 10 to 12 at the Edgewater Beach Hotel.

**NEW STATE OFFICIAL INAUGURATED YESTERDAY**

**Governor McKelvie Delivers Inaugural Address Before Joint Session of Legislature.**

Inauguration ceremonies for the newly elected state officers were held yesterday afternoon in Representative Hall of the Capitol building. The Senate and House of Representatives assembled in joint session at 1:30 p. m. and at this time the gallery and lobbies were already crowded with interested spectators. Committees were appointed by President of the Senate P. A. Barrows, who presided, to escort the Governor and other officers to the inaugural chamber.

The oath of office was administered by Chief Justice Andrew M. Morrissey, first to the Governor and then the other state officers and the members of the State Railway Commission. The men sworn in were Governor Samuel R. McKelvie, Secretary of State Darius M. Amsberry, State Treasurer D. B. Cropsey, Attorney General Clarence A. Davis, Land Commissioner Dan Swanson, State Superintendent John M. Matzen, and Railway Commissioners Thorne Browne and H. L. Cook. Of this number, all with the exception of Mr. Cook, of the Railway Commission, are entering upon their second term of office.

**Inaugural Address.**

After the formalities of the inauguration the presiding officer introduced Governor McKelvie who proceeded to deliver his inaugural address. He began by laying down three fundamental principles to be observed by the Legislature. These were: To make as few laws as possible, to make laws that serve the interest of all the people and not a favored few, and not to mistake agitation for progress.

Among other things the Governor recommended changes in the laws regarding taxation, corporations, law enforcement, pardons and paroles, prison reform, banking and insurance enterprises, dairy industries, and motor vehicles. He praised the Civil Administrative Code enacted by the last session of the Legislature, saying that it had served its purpose well and saved the state a considerable sum. He recommended, however, several changes in the various departments which the experience of the last two years have shown to be warranted.

The Governor's address was delivered in his usual forceful manner and was well connected and clear throughout. He received the undivided attention of the assembly from beginning to end. After adjournment from the legislative chamber, an impromptu reception was held in the corridors of the main floor of the Capitol.
