DEAN W. CLYDE DAVIS HOLDS DENTAL CLINIC

Dean W. Clyde Davis of the University of Nebraska College of Dentistry, held a clinic at the fifty-seventh annual meeting of the Chicago Dental Society January 27, 28 and 29 on "Structural Changes Within the Tooth's Pulp and Following Partial Pulp Removal and Partial Root Filling."

About five thousand dentists from all over the United States and Canada attended the meeting which, according to Dr. George G. Knapp, president of the society, was the most successful ever held. Clinics were held in all phases of dentistry and lectures were given by specialists. One day was devoted almost entirely to the subject of mouth hygiene, especially as it is being taught and demonstrated in the public schools. Dentistry as a public service was stressed at every meeting.

Sixteen hundred teachers from the public schools, excused by the superintendent of the city schools, attended the meeting and clinic for teachers and the general public on mouth hygiene.
