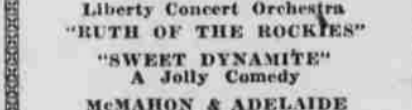

DOCTOR THOMAS SPEAKS ON "SOCIAL SERVICE"

A social service program was given at vespers Tuesday afternoon. Dr. David L. Thomas, student pastor for the Congregational church, spoke on "Social Service." Students representing University organizations as follows spoke: Kenneth McCandless, Industrial Research Club; Mary Leslie, Friendly Visiting Committee; Felle Farman, Campfire; Addehelt Dettman, Eight Weeks Club; Florence Sherman, Girl Reserves.

Dr. Thomas emphasized the opportunity for social service work even for those who are not specially trained and do not expect to be. He defined social service as anything that was done to stimulate in others higher ideals. He said that in a democratic country social democracy is very important; people must realize that all human beings have an equal right to live. In conclusion, he said that we must view others critically, constructively and charitably and strive for abundant life for every member of the community.

Mr. McCandless told of the street car strike in Denver. He went to Denver and worked in various industries for the purpose of investigating conditions among employees. While he was there the street car strike occurred.
