**SCHOLARSHIP OFFERED  
FOR STUDY IN SWEDEN**

The American-Scandinavian Foundation will award twenty Fellowships of at least \$1,000 each for graduate study in Sweden, Denmark and Norway.

Candidates must have been born in the United States or its possessions. They must be capable of original research and independent study and each must submit a definite plan of study. It is desirable that they be college graduates and familiar with at least one language in addition to English—preferably Swedish, Danish or Norwegian.

The stipend is \$1,000 and in a few cases \$1,200. Arrangement for a reduction in steamship rates on commercial vessels may be made by certain of the Fellows.

The period of study covers one academic year. Students in Forestry should sail in June that they may spend the summer in forests and forest schools.

Application papers, including letters of recommendation and a photograph, must be filed at the office of the Foundation before March 1. Papers may be sent in directly, but, if the candidate wishes the official endorsement of his college, they should be filed at the office of the president or dean of his college before March 1. Successful candidates will be notified about April 15. The final selection of Fellows will be made by a jury of university professors and technical experts appointed by the

Foundation. Application papers will be mailed on request to James Creese, Jr., assistant director of students, 25 West Forty-fifth street, New York City.

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
