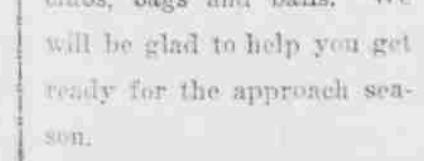

BATH is divided into an Upper and a Lower City. One section is on the top of a hill—the other extends between the foot of the cliff and the waterfront.

Four Otis Electric Elevators in two large vertical towers and the Otis Incline Railway planned here, carry the people up and down the cliff. The Incline Railway is built at an angle of 40 degrees; there are two cars working alternately, each with a capacity of 20 people and 1500 pounds freight and the trip is made in 10 seconds.
