AGRICULTURE CLUB ANNOUNCES PLANS

Members Discuss Farmers' Fair, New Method of Selecting Officers and Membership Drive.

WOULD REMOVE POLITICS

Fair in Spring May All Be Housed Under Canvas—Mammoth Parade Scheduled.

Plans for the annual Farmers' Fair were completed at a meeting of the Agricultural club Wednesday evening, a new system of electing officers was adopted, a membership campaign was launched, and a committee was appointed to draft a new constitution.

K. M. Fradenburg, '21, president of the Farmers' Fair board, outlined the program to be carried out this year at the Fair, April 7. The tentative plans are to house the entire Fair under canvas this year in order to avoid last year's experience of wet feet. Many new attractions are planned for this year's pageant including a parade intended to surpass all that ever took place in Lincoln. The various committees which were appointed last fall have begun to function, and reported material progress to the club.

Marlin Kreuzer, '22, presented a new plan of selecting the officers of the club, designed to eliminate some of the questionable politics of the past. The officers will be required to file their nominations with the dean of the Agricultural College, and will be elected by ballots on the University Farm campus.

Membership Drive Soon. The present constitution of the club, which has become obsolete for the most part, will be revised by the following committee: Mason Yerkes, '22, chairman; Royal Scheon, '21, and Harley Rhodes, '22. A membership drive will be launched to obtain every man eligible during the next ten days. The slogan of the drive will be "A greater Agricultural Club and a greater Agricultural College."

DRAMATIC CLUB WILL GIVE LAST PLAY OF YEAR

Only Chance to See Players in Action is this Evening—"Pygmalion" the Play.

The only chance to see the Dramatic club in action this year will be given to students and town people tonight when the curtain rises at 8:15 for the production of "Pygmalion," written by Bernard Shaw. The business management announces that today is not too late to secure tickets which are being sold at 50 cents and may be secured and reserved at the Curtis Music Store, 1240 O st.

The cast for the play at the Temple this evening is made up almost entirely of students who have appeared this winter in one or more of the plays given by the University Players. The dramatic club, is the official organ of the dramatic department and is open to students by tryout. It is reported that the ticket sales have been mainly among the people of the city and that to date not many University students have bought tickets.

Miss Alice Howell, head of the dramatic department, is coaching the play. The leading parts are carried by Eleanor Fogg, Rudyard Norton and Rhue Green. The last Dramatic club play was in 1915, when "Monsieur Beaucaire," by Booth Tarkington, was shown.

Coach Paul Schissler who is chairman of the referees and umpires committee for the tournament wants all the men whose names were in yesterday's paper and all "N" men to report to him to see about refereeing and umpiring for the contests.

NEBRASKAN MAY HAVE WIRELESS PRESS SERVICE

Michigan Proposes That the Large Schools Organize An Exchange.

Nebraska may be connected by radio service with the Universities of the middle west. The managing editor of the Michigan Daily, of the University of Michigan, sent the following letter to the editor of the Daily Nebraskan:

"We have, for some time, been interested in the possibility of establishing throughout the eastern and mid-western colleges a wireless press service whereby it would be possible for each University to send to other schools press reports covering the most significant happening or happenings of the day on its campus and, in turn, to receive such briefs from them regarding their own activities. Such a system appears to have been organized on the Pacific Coast, but apparently no extensive effort has been made so far in this part of the country to put such a service into operation.

"That does not mean that the idea is not feasible, however. Most of our Universities are equipped with some sort of radio apparatus and it is our opinion that this might well be utilized to the mutual benefit of all the various college newspapers. The present method of wire service, although somewhat more stable than the wireless, nevertheless, we believe does not fill our needs as completely as a well-established radio press service would do and, of course, our system of college exchanges by mail is a farce compared with radio."

"We are anxious to see if some such arrangement cannot be started and, to that end, are writing to a number of schools that are believed to possess good radio facilities. We have no

Cornhuskers Plotting Downfall of Ames Five in Contests this Week-End.

SCHISSLER IS OPTIMISTIC

Iowa Farmers Rate Strong in Valley Circles—Defeated Nebraska Once.

The Huskers went through one of the stiffest scrimmages of the year last evening at the Coliseum. Coach Schissler sent his men against the fast Cotner quintet and the Freshman team combined.

Ames will arrive in Lincoln this afternoon and will work out on the Coliseum floor this evening. The Iowans are in first class shape for the two contests and promise to give Nebraska a real battle for the long end of the score.

The Ames team resembles the Huskers a great deal in appearance. All of their men are small and are exceedingly fast on their feet. By comparative scores Ames has one of the best teams in the Missouri Valley. The Iowa aggregation doubled the score on the fast Kansas Aggie team and held Missouri winners of the conference, to an eight point victory.

Schissler is Optimistic.

Coach Schissler feels that the Huskers can defeat the Iowa men but will make no predictions on the outcome of the contest. "The Ames quintet are a fast bunch and should give Nebraska one of the hardest tussles of the year. The Iowa bunch shoot baskets in streaks but are not consistent in putting the ball through the hoop," is the "dope" given out by Coach Schissler yesterday.

Inter-Frat Basketball.

THREE PAID FELLOWSHIPS OFFERED FOR RESEARCH

Women's Educational and Industrial Union Make It Possible To Continue Work.

Three paid fellowships in socio-economic research are offered each year by the Women's Educational and Industrial Union to women who wish through preparation for such work. The fellowships carry a stipend of \$500. Clerical assistance, equipment and traveling expenses necessary for the investigation are furnished by the department of research.

A degree from a college of good standing, training in economics or sociology, and satisfactory references in regard to health, character and special fitness for socio-economic research are required for all candidates for the fellowship. These selected are expected to devote their entire time for ten months to the training given in the making and criticism of schedules, in field work, in the construction and interpretation of statistical tables and in the literary presentation of the results.

Students who have received satisfactory undergraduate training in sociology and economics may offer the year's work in the research department in fulfillment of requirements for the degree of Master of Science at Simmons College, Tufts College, and a number of other colleges. Applications must be filled before May 1.
