Student Opinion

To the Editor of the Daily Nebraskan:

The Student Council says "WE WANT TO REMAIN." Similarly, a few years ago, when Congressman Volstead stepped into the limelight brewers from every corner of the United States said the same as does the Student Council, "WE WANT TO REMAIN." This is only human nature, for self-preservation is one of the strongest instincts of the human race, and one of the primary purposes of education.

The student body should not let itself be deceived into believing that the Council is of one mind in asking for continued existence, for several of the members realize that the Council is, has been and always will be a non-functioning institution of this school and believe in all sincerity that it should be abolished.

The Student Council of the University of Nebraska has never functioned as have the student councils of other institutions whose success is used as an excuse for having a student council here, where conditions are entirely different. It has not functioned, because for years before the Student Council was created the activities of the council as formulated in other schools was already being well cared for here, principally by faculty committees, and, secondarily, by existing student committees. The Executive Dean and Dean of Women rightfully have full control of the discipline of the school. The Scholarship Committee has charge of delinquencies. The Publication Board, consisting of appointed faculty members and democratically elected student members, has control of student publications. The Eligibility Committee has charge of the eligibility of athletes for athletic contests. The Student Activities Office handles the money of student organizations. The Extension Department has absolute charge of University Week.

The above named activities are the ones directed by the students councils of other schools which are so widely quoted as being successful in the supervision of extra curricula activities. These same activities are almost ideally handled at the University of Nebraska by the existing committees and organizations.

Therefore, the Student Council has no function to perform in the Nebraska University, nor has it been able to find even one task after two years of a most diligent search coupled with frantic appeals for something to do. It is a weed in the social garden of our school and will in time detract from the harmony of student life.
