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JUDGING CONTESTS FOR SMITH-HUGHES STUDENTS

Tentative Plans Made to Enlarge Scope of Stock Judging Competitions.

At a conference of 24 agricultural Smith-Hughes instructors at the University Farm Saturday afternoon, April 2, tentative plans were adopted to extend the scope of next year's judging contest. A three-day contest was planned to include the placing of twelve classes of live stock, including three classes of dairy cattle, grain grading demonstration and an individual shop project. It would require six men to compete in all of these events, and each man would be allowed to compete in only one contest. A new rule was adopted which forbids all men who have competed in a contest from competing in a similar contest the following year. It was also decided not to set any definite age limit. Prof. H. E. Bradford and C. W. Watson, state supervisor of agricultural education, presented the matter of extending the contest.


The addition of dairy, agronomy and shop work will tend to make a much larger registration for next year's contest.

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
