BASEBALL TEAM GETS INTO ACTION TODAY

Diamond Artists to Mix With Scrubs on State Farm Campus.

Nebraska's diamond athletes will get into action tomorrow when Coach Schissler will send a picket team against the remainder of the squad. The 1921 baseball schedule has not as yet been completed, but will probably be published in Sunday's edition of the Daily Nebraskan. Director Luehring is dickering for a few more games to round out the schedule.

Thus far the turnout for the Husker baseball nine has been very good. Coach Schissler has about the same size squad on hand for this year's team as reported last spring. All of the men who have reported for the pitching staff will be given a tryout in tomorrow's contest.

The new diamond at the State Farm campus is in fairly good shape at present and everything will be ready for the opening of the season. Coach John Pickett of the Freshman team gave his men a light workout on the Cushman Park diamond last evening. Twenty men have reported for the first year team and with the array of material on hand Coach Pickett expects to develop a formidable opponent for the Varsity.

COLGATE PROFESSOR VISITS ON CAMPUS

Prof. E. P. Sisson of Colgate University, visited on the campus Tuesday morning and met several of his former students who are located here in Lincoln. He has taught mathematics at Hamilton, N. Y., for fifty-three consecutive years and is now taking his first leave of absence to visit friends and relatives in the middle west with Mrs. Sisson.

Former Colgate students with whom Professor Sisson visited are Prof. Herbert Brownell, Dr. W. T. Elmore, Rev. Polk and Rev. Ainslie, all of Lincoln. Professor Sisson is a graduate of Oswego (N. Y.) State Normal. Two members of the Nebraska faculty, Professor Brownell and Dr. Lida B. Earhart, are also Oswego graduates. "The Tailor-Made Man," by Harry Edmund Smith, will be the next offering of the University Players. Rehearsals are now being staged and the dates set for the production of the play are April 21, 22 and 23.

"Seventeen," the popular novel by Booth Tarkington, was to have been the next feature put on by the University Players but on account of not being able to secure this play, Miss Howell is using "The Tailor-Made Man," as a substitute.

"The Tailor-Made Man" is a comedy of the highest character and provides for a large amount of comedy between the lesser characters. The plot centers around the tailor's apprentice who borrows a dress suit for a formal occasion. A large number of complications result from the dress suit episode and the final windup is a comedy alone. A large cast has been selected for this production.

This play had a long run at a prominent Broadway theater and was first presented to the public two years ago. Its production by the University Players will be the first time this great comedy has been produced west of Chicago.
