

Western Trip up to "Big Ten." IOWA CITY, Ia., Dec. 1.-The board of athletics at the University of Iowa met here last night with Dr. William Buffield of Los Angeles for the purpose of discussing the probabilities of Iowa participating in a football game at the Tournament of Roses at Pasadena, Calif., New Year's day. Little is known of what the purpose of the Californians' visit was but the board came out flatfooted and passed a resolution against the proposed trip.
