

## CALL MADE FOR WRESTLING TEAM

**Dr. Clapp Wants More Candidates Out—Attends Association Meeting.**

Dr. Clapp, coach of the wrestling team, yesterday issued an additional call for candidates for the wrestling team. A number of new men appeared for work yesterday and the class now numbers about fifty men. The wrestling season is getting away to a flying start this year, and probably three meets will be held before the first of February, the usual date for the opening of the wrestling season. Dr. Clapp attended a meeting of the Western Inter-collegiate Gymnastic, Wrestling and Fencing association, held last Friday and Saturday in Chicago, at which a revision of the wrestling rules of the association was made.

The wrestling class now numbers fifty men, but many more are expected to join the class before the end of the week. Anybody who wishes to may attend the classes and will receive one hour credit. The regular class period is from 4 to 5 on Monday, Wednesday and Friday while the team practice is from 5 to 6 on these days and from 4 to 6 on Tuesday and Thursday.

Almost all the veterans of last year's team are back. Captain-elect F. K. Reed, Troutman and Bengston letter men last year, are out, besides a large number of other experienced mat men. G. S. Salter, a member of the team two years ago, may be out for the team.

Altho no definite dates for wrestling meets have been set, indications point to two or possibly three meets before the first of February when the mat season is usually opened. One or two practice meets will probably be held. Nebraska has two year contracts with Iowa and Ames, and meets with these two schools will be held here, but the dates have not yet been set. Negotiations are also under way for a dual meet with Oklahoma, and a number of the "Big Ten" schools are being dickered in regard to wrestling meets, but no plans have been completed yet. Nebraska will enter a team in the Western Inter-Collegiate meet, to be held at Wisconsin this year.

Dr. Clapp attended a meeting of the Western Inter-Collegiate Gymnastic, Wrestling and Fencing association at Chicago last Friday and Saturday. Dr. Clapp is the president of this association. At the Chicago session, the association made a number of important changes in the rules, especially in regard to the time of the rounds, and in the method of determining the team and individual champions of the association.

### Registration From Twenty-Six States

Twenty-six states beside Nebraska have representatives among the University of Nebraska students, a survey of the student directories published recently shows. Beside the twenty-seven states in this country who can lay claim to some of the students in the Cornhusker school there are seven foreign countries which have persons claiming affilia-

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tion with them registered in Nebraska.

Of the states outside of Nebraska represented at the Cornhusker Iowa leads the list with 180 students, Kansas comes next with ninety-two, South Dakota third with sixty-four and Colorado fourth with forty-four.

Of the foreign possessions of the United States represented with students at Nebraska, the Philippine islands claim first honors with eight, Hawaii second with six. Other countries register students also. Japan has two students claiming her as their home and Canada, India, Korea and Mexico each have registered one.

### 306 Nebraska Towns.

Three hundred and six Nebraska towns claim a varying number of students who are attending the university. Of these Lincoln has the most with full ten pages of names in the directory. Omaha comes next with two full pages. University Place next with seventy-nine names, taking up one-half page. Beatrice claims thirty-nine students, and Columbus, Fremont and Hastings come close up in the list with thirty odd names.

Among the fraternities, Delta Sigma Delta tops the honors with fifty men claiming affiliation while Alpha Sigma Phi comes second with forty-two names. Kappa Kappa Gamma lays claim to the sorority record with forty-six names although Delta Gamma follows close with forty-two.
