

## INTER-COLLEGIATE DEBATE SCHEDULED

Nebraska to Meet Iowa and South Dakota on April 7

Nebraska's inter-collegiate debates for this college year will be with the University of Iowa and with the University of South Dakota, according to announcement Saturday by Prof. M. M. Fogg of the department of English. The new schedule, which takes the place of the Nebraska-Iowa dual debates since the war, will include Nebraska-South Dakota at Lincoln and Nebraska-Iowa at Iowa City. The contests will be held Friday evening, April 7.

The up-to-date, important question of the allied debts, proposed by Nebraska, will be discussed. The phrasing of the proposition is: "Resolved, that the United States should cancel the allied debts." A Nebraska team will maintain the affirmative at Lincoln and another team the negative at Iowa City. The question is considered by university professors of economics, law, and English, specially interested in debate, as very timely.

The selection of Nebraska's representatives in the 1922 debate forum will be begun at a preliminary contest, held before the middle of February, open to all students in good standing who were in the university last semester.

Mr. John T. Zimmer, who has been an assistant in the museum during the past semester, left Wednesday for Field Museum of Natural History, Chicago, Ill. After spending a couple of preparatory months Mr. Zimmer will be placed in charge of a field party and will be sent to South America to collect birds and mammals. Mr. Zimmer becomes at once assistant curator, department of Ornithology, and is in direct line for promotion to the directorship.

Professor Charles Fordyce addressed the members of the Women's club of Grand Island Monday evening on the subject "Vocational Guidance."

A collection of arrow points, scrapers, drills, spear points, from Zapata county, Texas, and numerous pieces of pottery from the Pueblo ruins at Pecos, N. M., has been secured and donated to the Nebraska state museum by Mr. L. W. Petree, an assistant in the department of geology and geography.

"Primitive Serret Societies," a work by Professor Hutton Webster of the department of history, has appeared in an Italian translation by Dr. Pettazzoni of the Royal University of Bologna. A Japanese version of this book was published a few years ago.

Professor Hutton Webster of the department of history was the contributor of a large number of articles dealing with tattoo, tattooism, and related anthropological subjects, to the "Dictionary of Religion and Ethics" recently published by the MacMillan Co., under the editorship of Professor Matthews and Smith of the University of Chicago.

Professor Hutton Webster has edited with the assistance of Dr. D. C. Knowlton and Professor C. D. Hazen of Columbia university, what is probably the finest series of historical wall maps ever produced in the United States. Forty-four maps are included in the series, covering ancient, medieval and modern history. The publishers are A. J. Nyström & Co., Chicago, and the maps may be secured separately, if so desired.

### BOY SCOUT LEADERS TO SECURE TRAINING

Training for boy scout leaders is being given at the teachers' college every Tuesday evening by the university extension department. Two lessons have already been taught and eight more are offered. The instructors include Prof. A. A. Reed, Prof. A. M. Newens, Prof. R. A. Wolcott, Dr. R. J. Pool, Dr. Chas. Fordyce, Dean O. J. Ferguson, Prof. G. D. Swezey, Mr. Kent, the scout executive, and a number of the more experienced scout masters.

The study of birds, first aid, badges, organization, trees, names, activities, signaling, fire making, story telling, psychology, hiking and camping, judging, programs, map meetings, and astronomy, will be making, cooking, compasses, troop taught and practiced.

All men interested in scouting are invited to attend the meeting.

## MORE GIRLS NEEDED OUT FOR BASKETBALL

W. A. A. Issues Calls For Co-eds To Try For Class Teams This Week.

A call for more girls to play basketball has been issued by the women's athletic association. Almost every girl in school has played the game, and has a fair chance with others in making her class team. There are enough practice periods to give every girl a chance to get the required ten in before March.

All girls who complete the ten practices will play in the Monte Carlo tournament, (so called because the players are drawn by position for teams.) This also awards fifty W. A. A. points, with an additional twenty-five to the winning team. After this tourney the class teams will be chosen from the players. All members of class teams will sacrifice the fifty points received in the first tourney, and receive 100 points for class team. Fifty additional points will be given to the members of the winning class teams.

Eleanor Snell, a senior, who has played on her class team every year, is the W. A. A. sport leader. The practice periods are between gym classes, on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays; noon every day; 9, 10, 1, 2, on Tuesdays; 1, 2 on Thursdays. Each practice is supervised by a W. A. A. member or gym teacher.
