FELLOWSHIP WILL BE AWARDED TO TWENTY

American Scandinavian Foundation Will Give Fellowships of at Least \$1,000 Each.

The American-Scandinavian foundation will award twenty fellowships of at least \$1,000 each for graduate study in the Scandinavian countries.

Sweden: Ten fellowships in any of the following subjects: Chemistry, agricultural sciences, administrative or social sciences, forestry, mining and metallurgy, hydro-electricity, language and literature and other humanistic subjects.

Denmark: Five fellowships in any of the following subjects: Industrial organization, co-operative agriculture, agricultural sciences, bacteriology, chemistry, folk high schools, language and literature and other humanistic subjects.

Norway: Five fellowships in any of the following subjects: Weather forecasting, oceanography, hydro-electricity, forestry, agricultural sciences, chemistry, physics, language and literature, and other humanistic subjects.

Instructions for Candidates. Candidates must have been born in the United States or its possessions.

It is desirable that they be college graduates and familiar with at least one language in addition to English—preferably Swedish, Danish or Norwegian.

The stipend will be \$1,000 and in a few cases \$1,200. Arrangement for a reduction in steamship rates on commercial vessels may be made certain of the fellows.

One academic year will be the period of study. Students in forestry should sail in June that they may spend the summer in forests and forest schools.

Those desiring appointment should file application papers, including letters of recommendation and a photograph, at the office of the foundation before March 15.

Application blanks may be secured at the chancellor's office. The following letter concerning the Fellowships has been received:

Other kind of realism of appearances, those who press it into a decorative arrangement giving another pattern of truths, are represented by Hassam, Easton and Priesseke. Then there are those who seek to produce forms purely creative, such as Arthur B. Davies, Frank Vincent Du Mond and Ernest Lawson.

This exhibition is one of fifty-eight circulated from coast to coast by The American Federation of Arts in its national work in favor of American art appreciation.

Major Kidwell Tells Of Strange Experience

Was Discharged a Few Weeks Ago After Thirty Years in the U. S. Army.

Major Frank A. Kidwell, O. R. C., keeper of the military storehouse of the Nebraska R. O. T. C., has had enough experiences and adventures to fill a dozen articles like this.

"I'm a stickler for education," declares Major Kidwell. "It is absolutely essential in these times for a man or woman to have one. It is one of the few things that can be called a necessity."

"I enlisted in the army in 1891 after hearing a cousin who had enlisted talk about its merits. I've never had cause to regret the act and can look back over the life with perfect satisfaction."

"After three years in Cuba at the time of the Spanish-American war, I and my family came back to America and I was detailed for duty at West Point. The West Point-Annapolis football game was the first big event that had happened for us in three years."

"I received my appointment as a major during the war while fighting with the Ninety-first. That bunch saw some real fighting. Just after we were all worn out and our ranks greatly thinned by the Argonne Forest battle, they loaded us on a train and shipped us to Belgium."
