ESSAY PRIZES OFFERED TO NEBRASKA STUDENTS

Babson's Statistical Organization Makes Splendid Offer to Writers

Roger W. Babson's Statistical Organization offers three prizes, of \$500, \$250 and \$100 respectively, for the best essay on one of the following subjects: Effects of Religion on the Business Cycle; Relation Between Labor and the Business Cycle; Why Business Men Study Economic Cycles; Forecasting the Purchasing Power of a Sales Territory; Analyzing an Industry to Forecast Its Activity; and Analyzing Commodities to Forecast Their Price Trends.

The subjects include a wide enough field to make it possible for all competitors to choose a subject in which they are interested, and with which they are more or less familiar. Competitors are not confined to any particular phase or phases of any of the subjects. It is the purpose of the competition to develop a full interest in our vital business problems amongst our future leaders in the business and social life of this country.

The conditions for competition are: All undergraduates who are officially registered in any college or university are eligible; manuscripts must be limited to from 3500 to 5000 words, typewritten on one side of the paper and double spaced; any number of graphic presentations may be included in the report; do not put name or address on the manuscript, but on a separate slip of paper mailed with manuscript; no manuscripts will be returned; a copy should be kept by the writer if he or she wishes to retain the composition; no information bearing on any of the subjects will be given out by the Babson's Statistical Organization; all reports must be in the mail by the 15th of May, 1922. The address of the Contest Editor is Wellesley Hills 22, Mass.

DR. KIRCHMAN ADDRESSES LINCOLN GRADE BOYS

Dr. J. E. Kirchman, Professor of Finance of the Business Administration College, addressed a group of boys of the Junior Civic League of the seventh grade of the Lincoln schools, Thursday morning in the Social Science building.

The trip of the boys was linked up with the study of arithmetic. In discussing thrift, Dr. Kirchman pointed out the importance of labor-saving devices and elements of conservation.

Besides giving the students the insight into several technical business matters, Dr. Kirchman discussed: What is thrift? Why be thrifty? What is the best way to save? Must one earn extra money in order to save? Where may one keep one's savings in order that one may be sure that they are available in later life?

DEAN LeROSSIGNOL IS WRITING SERIES OF ARTICLES FOR LEGION

Dean J. E. Le Rossignol of the Business Administration College is writing a series of articles on "Elementary Economics and the Present Industrial System," for the Midwest Veteran, official organ of the Nebraska department of the American Legion. The first of these articles appeared April 11. Others in the series, which will include about twenty-five chapters, will appear semi-monthly.

This work is part of the Americanization program of the Legion, which is trying to acquaint its members with the most important facts of our society.

It is expected that the articles, which form a sort of primer of social economics, will be enlarged and revised and published in book form.

PROF. SCHRAMM BACK FROM PITT CONVENTION

Professor E. F. Schramm of the University has just returned from Pittsburgh, Pa., where he attended a national convention of the Sigma Gamma Epsilon, an honorary professional fraternity devoted to the interests of Geology, Mining and Me-

terallurgy. Professor Schramm has been a national officer of this fraternity for the past four years, and was re-elected as a member of the grand council. The leading mining schools and universities of the United States were represented at this convention. The next convention is to be held at Golden, Colorado.

While in Pittsburgh, Professor Schramm visited the School of Mines of Pittsburgh University and made arrangements with the dean of the school for an exchange collection of minerals with that institution.

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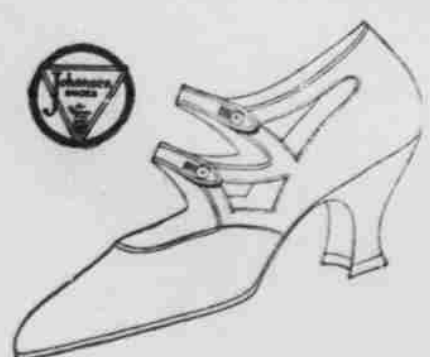
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
