In a discussion of two new works in linguistics, "Language, Its Nature and Development," by Professor Otto Jespersen of the University of Copenhagen, and "Language: An Introduction to the Study of Speech," by Edward Sapir, H. L. Mencken remarks in the book columns of the May number of the Smart Set, "Why the native American tongue of Americans and Englishmen is so grossly neglected by our students is one of the mysteries of scholarship. . . . In the United States, once you have mentioned Dr. Louise Pound and Dr. G. P. Knapp, you have exhausted the list of those who have contributed anything to the study of it as a living speech. The rest are archeologists, pedagogues, philological theologians."

TRYOUTS FOR DRAKE RELAYS HARD FOUGHT

The Kiwanis club of this city has been granted permission by the United States government to use radio instruments with a wave length of 360 meters in broadcasting the results of the Drake relay meet April 28 and 29.

This is the first time in the history of athletes that the result of such a meet has been flashed through the air by wireless as rapidly as the events are concluded.

Colleges and universities in nearly twenty states have announced that receiving sets are being installed in order to receive the results of the meet.

Because the broadcasting of messages over a 360 meter radius is contrary to government statutes, it was necessary that special permission be secured. A telegram received yesterday by local authorities from C. H. Hunton, assistant secretary of commerce at Washington brought the necessary permission. The 260 meter wave length will be permitted between the hours of 2 and 5 o'clock on the two days of the meet. The temporary call letters of the Des Moines station will be WBAC.

Thousands of people in all parts of the United States who will be unable to attend the Drake meet, will be informed of the positions in which teams finish at the end of each event.

Opening Day Events

Events on Friday, the opening day of the meet, will be run in the following order: 100 yard dash preliminaries; first section Class "B" half mile high school relay; second section Class "B" half mile high school relay; two mile class "B" high school relay; class "B" high school shuttle race; university and college 120 yard high hurdle preliminaries; class "B" high school mile relay, 440 yard low hurdle university and college preliminaries and class "B" high school medley race.

The following order of events will be maintained on Saturday, the main day of the "Western Olympic" meet: class "A" high school half mile relay, first and second sections; two mile relay, class "A" high schools;

120 yard high hurdles, university and college; two mile relay, university; final in university and college 100 yard dash; two mile relay, college; 440 yard low hurdles, universities and colleges; one mile relay, class "A" high schools; university 440 yard relay in two sections; university four mile relay; high school shuttle race, class "A"; grade school shuttle race; college one mile relay; university half mile relay, two sections; high school medley race, class "A"; one mile special match race; college half mile relay; university one mile relay in two sections.

Finals in the college and university field events will be held Saturday afternoon in connection with the track events. Finals in the javelin throw, shot put, high jump, discus throw, broad jump, and pole vault will be held.

The program will begin at 2 o'clock on Friday, the opening day, and at 1:30 on Saturday, Director Wilson announced.

Railroads Offer Rates
Excursion rates to the Drake relays here will be offered by every railroad which holds a membership in the Western Passenger association, rail officials announced yesterday.

Tickets may be purchased April 27, 28 and 29, and their return limit has been set at May 1, so that visitors may spend Sunday in Des Moines if they desire.

The rates will be good throughout the passenger association territory, comprising practically every state between Chicago and the Pacific coast. Most of the roads are offering fare and one-half for the round trip from points within Iowa and the certificate plan will be used from points outside the state.

Although the final tabulation of entries has not been completed, the meet will far surpass any track event ever held in this section. K. L. "Tug" Wilson, Drake director, believes. Tickets for the meet are practically unobtainable due to the unprecedented advance rush for seats.
