

CORNER STONE TO BE LAID IN FALL

Six days additional time has been granted by the state capitol commission to prospective bidders on twenty-six different kinds of construction work on the north and south wings, which are included in the first section of the new capitol. The time for opening and tabulating

bids has been set ahead from June 8 to June 14, at 9 a. m., in order to give contractors more time to figure. The commission has practically decided that the laying of the corner stone for the new edifice shall take place during state fair week in September. That is considered the most suitable time, as thousands of visitors from over the state will be in Lincoln then and will have an opportunity to view the progress made on the building.

All members of the capitol commission will be present except possibly W. W. Head who is planning a trip abroad in July from which he may not return until late in September. Governor McKelvie will probably officiate at the cornerstone ceremonial. The stone will be at the northeast corner. Historical material to be placed inside it is now being compiled.

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day was ended with a dance.
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


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
