

**TREASURY REPORT SHOWS A DECREASE IN U. S. EXPENSES**

WASHINGTON, May 18. — Ordinary government expenditures for the ten months of the present fiscal year fell off by nearly \$1,500,000,000 compared with the corresponding period of last year, while public debt disbursements declined over \$1,000,000,000, according to a statement of the government outlay from July 1 1921 to April 30, 1922, issued by the treasury.

Interest on the public debt amounting to \$700,000,000 was the largest item of ordinary expenditure during the ten months of this year, compared with \$772,000,000 last year, while the redemption of treasury certificates of indebtedness account for \$3,914,000,000 of public debt disbursements during the present year, against \$6,375,000,000 for the corresponding months last year.

Since July 1, 1921, the treasury has retired \$1,316,000,000 of Victory notes under its policy for refunding the short dated debt, compared with \$177,000,000 during the same period last year.

**400 CARLOADS OF DIRT REMOVED AT THE CAPITOL**

Over 400 carloads of dirt, or a total already been taken out of the new state capitol excavation since the digging started on April 27. The biggest amount removed in any one day was 47 carloads — 940 cubic yards—last Saturday. Two steam drags are making good progress with the excavation.

A representative of the Jarrett-Chambers Co., New York engineering firm supervising the foundation construction, has arrived in Lincoln to inspect the holes sunk from the large excavation down to the Dakota sandstone, into which concrete will be poured for supporting piers. The placing of concrete is ready to start as soon as he O. K.'s the work.

About fifty prospective bidders on different kinds of work in connection with the capitol superstructure have obtained plans and specifications from the capitol commissioners office. Bids are to be received on June 8.

**WINTER WHEAT IS MAKING A NORMAL GAIN, IS REPORT**

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Winter wheat and other fall sown grains continued during the past week to make normal gains according to the crop review issued by the United States department of agriculture last night. It was added, however, that "rain is needed in portions of the northeast and in some north central states, especially Iowa and eastern Nebraska," and the wheat in the far northwest would respond to warm weather.

"Germination of spring wheat has been good throughout the belt," the report said, "and the early sown crop is looking good generally. Oats made satisfactory progress also, although moisture is needed in some quarters, especially in the upper Mississippi valley districts."

Work in the corn fields generally accomplished good results, the review said, planting being under way "nearly to the northern limits of the belt" and early sowing coming up as far north as the Ohio valley.

**CATTLE BRANDS TAKE PLACE OF MONOGRAMS ON RANCHER'S AUTOS**

Monograms on automobiles are no longer stylish among ranchmen in northwestern Nebraska, but instead the cattlemen now have their private brands with which they mark their cattle stamped on the sides of their cars in gold leaf, according to E. 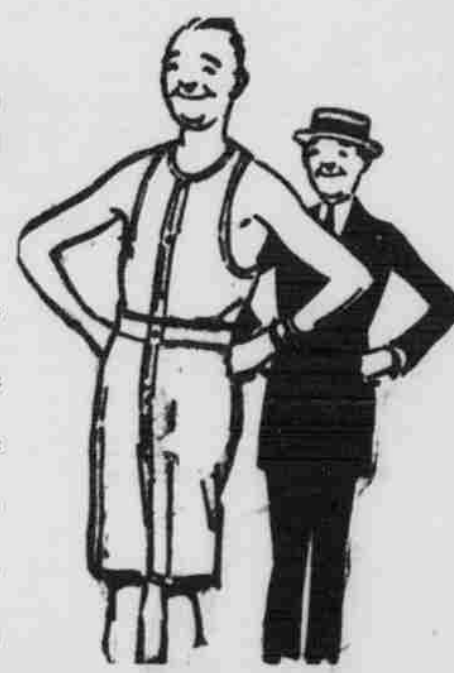

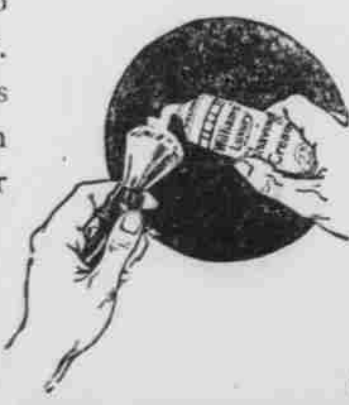
