

General Athletic Development Stressed by Um. Military Department

Among the Military department's first interests is that of general athletic development. Physical fitness is essential to effective service, a necessary characteristic of leadership. The initial purpose of instruction in beginning the first year's work, is to cause the student to acquire his "set up." Both setting-up exercises and drills at attention are in part efforts toward this end. The same idea is in mind when the student is continually cautioned against falling into slouchy postures. Eight per cent of the first year's work is allotted to physical training, and devoted either to setting up exercises or to mass games.

In addition to scheduled physical training, the Military department with a view to furthering general athletic development, encouraging organization spirit, and co-operating with the Athletic plepartment in uncovering and bringing out new material, has interested itself in developing intercompany competition. 
