

PLAN TO IMPROVE DAILY NEBRASKAN

New Staff Says It Will Have a Larger and More Carefully Edited Paper

A larger circulation, a more carefully edited paper, a larger and better trained staff and closer co-operation with the publications of other Missouri Valley schools are some of the aims of the business and editorial staffs of the Daily Nebraskan for the coming semester.

Circulation manager, Frank Fry. The office of the Nebraskan will be moved into better quarters in the basement of administration hall, in the room formerly occupied by the student activities office. In the new location, the editorial staff will be closer to the administrative offices of the university and will not be bothered by class recitations or lectures.

Two former editors of the Nebraskan will be included on the staff of the paper with the opening of the new semester, Jack Austin and Orvin Gaston will be connected with the reportorial side. Other students have been secured to help gather the news of the campus who have not worked on the Nebraskan in former years but have had much experience at other colleges or on city newspapers. Upperclassmen will as far as possible, be used on the staff of the paper.

The first issue of the Nebraskan will

be issued during registration week before the opening of regular class work. Editions will be published in the interest of the student athletic ticket sale campaign which will be started during the first days of registration. The subscription campaign for the Nebraskan will reveal several changes of policy over the plans used by former staffs.
