

HUSKERS LOSE OPENING GAME TO K. U. FIVE

Kansas Cagesters Defeat Nebraska Basket Tossers by 30 to 20 Score Friday Night.

COZIER IS STAR OF FRAY

Coach Frank's Second Team Goes in and Outplays Jayhawks During the Second Half.

Going into the contest with the score 18 to 2 against them, Coach Frank's sophomore Husker quintet

staged a rally and scored 14 points, against the Jayhawks, but lost, 30 to 20, in the opening game of the 1923 Missouri Valley cage race. The fast Kansas cagesters gained a commanding lead in the first fifteen minutes of play against the veteran Nebraska team, and smothered the offense of the Husks with an airtight five-man defense.

Fifteen minutes of the first half had elapsed before the Cornhuskers secured their first points on a long shot by Carman. With but three minutes of the first half to go, Coach Frank sent in his sophomore team. Cozier, forward, immediately sprang into the limelight by shooting two goals for Nebraska in rapid succession. The half ended 18 to 6 in favor of Kansas.

Nebraska came back strong in the second half and scored 14 points to the Jayhawks 12. Usher, Husker

forward was injured in the second period and Warren went back into the game. With this exception, Coach Frank's second team finished the game. Cozier, Husker forward, shot three more baskets in the second half. Cozier was the star of the game, scoring 11 of Nebraska's 20 points. Captain Warren scored two goals and one foul toss, while Tipton and Carman collected one basket apiece.

The Kansas team, which tied for the valley championship last year, played an excellent game, of which their five-man defense was the feature. Bowman, Black and Ackerman divided scoring honors for the Jayhawks, each shooting three field goals, while Captain Endacott's close guarding was worthy of note.
